This popular whakatauki suggests that by sharing our talents and resources we will have sufficient for everyone to prosper. This is the idea behind Child Poverty Action Group's hui to build community activism to end child poverty in Aotearoa. Na Ta Tatou Rourou is being held on 7th-8th October at Manurewa Marae in South Auckland. Anyone who is interested in building community based activism to end child poverty is encouraged to attend.

Hui details

DATE:	7 TH -8 TH October Powhiri at 9:00am
VENUE:	Manurewa Marae 81 Finlayson Ave Manurewa South Auckland
COSTS:	Costs have been kept to a minimum to make the hui as accessible as possible. The standard fee for the hui is \$150 although a discounted fee of \$100 is available to people who are unwaged or working as a volunteer or for a voluntary organisation. Groups or individuals who are able to pay extra to support the hui are asked to pay \$200.
REGISTRATION	Registration will be on a first come first in basis with numbers limited to 120 people. You can register on line by emailing your details (name address & phone number) to CPAG at admin@cpag.org.nz and by depositing the hui fee in CPAG's bank account (account details on the back of this page) or by filling in the form on the back of this page and sending it with a cheque to CPAG at P.O. Box 56-150 Mt Eden Auckland.
CATERING	All meals including morning and afternoon teas are provided in the hui fee. Vegetarian meal options will be available and if you have any special dietary needs please let us know.
ACCOMMODATION	Marae style accommodation is available on the night of 7 th October and the cost is included in the hui fee. Please bring your own sleeping bag or blankets and linen if you intend taking this option.
TRANSPORT:	The Manurewa Marae is less than 15 minutes drive from Auckland Airport and about 15 minutes walk from Homai railway station. We are able to provide complimentary transport to and from the airport or railway station if you can provide us with early notice of your arrival details.
CHILDREN.	Children are welcome to come along although we have no specific facilities or events for them. The hui is taking place during the school holidays so the Manurewa Marae is offering children's school holiday programmes which any child may attend at a small fee. We can arrange enrolments in these programmes.
ENTERTAINMENT	An informal social function may be arranged on the evening of 7 th October if there is sufficient interest

The purpose of the Hui

CPAG expects this hui will provide participants with opportunities to share their experiences in working to address child poverty and that it will assist participants to gain a better understanding of the nature and extent of child poverty in Aotearoa. From these experiences and improved understandings it is hoped that we can develop collectively more effective strategies and practices to eliminate poverty both in local communities and at a national level.

Hui programme

The hui programme will involve a mixture of presentations and workshops which will be structured around four themes:

Violence free – making Aotearoa safe for all our children

Supporting families – working past the present welfare mess

Just education – how can we overcome inequality within education

Healthy communities – addressing the health needs of our poorest children

Against these themes invited speakers and small group workshops will consider a range of perspectives from big-picture strategies for change to short-term tactics and local responses to child poverty

A more detailed programme will be provided to those who register about two weeks before the hui.
